Subject-Specific Provisions for the Master of Arts in Sinology

dated 11 July 2018

On 24 June 2019 in accordance with Section 108 subsection 1 of the Hamburg higher education act (Hamburgisches Hochschulgesetz, HmbHG) dated 18 July 2001 (HmbGVBl. p. 171) last amended by Article 1 of the Act dated 29 May 2018 (HmbGVBl. p. 200), the Executive University Board of the University of Hamburg ratified the Subject-Specific Provisions for the Master of Arts Sinology adopted by the Faculty of Humanities on 11 July 2018 pursuant to Section 91 subsection 2 no. 1 HmbHG.

Preamble

These Subject-Specific Provisions supplement the revisions to the Examination Regulations by the Faculty of Humanities at the University of Hamburg for Master of Arts Degree Programs dated from 6 May 2015, as amended, and furnish a description of the modules for the Master of Arts in Sinology.

I. Supplemental provisions

Section 1:

Program and examination objectives, academic degree, and implementation of the degree program

Section 1 subsection 1:

- (1) The Master of Arts in Sinology is research focused and builds on a bachelor's degree in Sinology or a comparable subject on historical and contemporary Chinese culture and society, and expands students' academic research skills. Besides methodological reflection on Chinese sources, the program focuses on theoretical approaches to cultural studies and the history of concepts and ideas. Graduates are able to evaluate transdisciplinary theoretical concepts from a sinological perspective and to apply these to specific research questions. They can moreover confidently employ a broad range of subject-specific analytical methods and theoretical concepts. The program also prepares students for doctoral studies.
- (2) The program comprises a required area, specialization area, and subject-specific elective area. The specialization area consists of two specializations, one of which must be selected at the start of the program:
 - Culture and Society
 - Conceptual and Intellectual History

Culture and Society is taught in English and German and imparts methodological skills in the use of Chinese sources from different eras (classical period through to the twenty-first century) and social contexts (e.g., political, philosophical, religious). Students gain knowledge of transdisciplinary theories from cultural studies, social science, and history to apply to Sinology questions.

Conceptual and Intellectual History is taught in English and also imparts methodological skills for using Chinese sources from different eras and social contexts. It moreover provides an introduction to questions, theories, and methods of the history of concepts and ideas. Students learn to apply aspects of the history of concepts and ideas to Chinese sources through extensive reading of theoretical texts and focused studies.

Culture and Society and Conceptual and Intellectual History differ not only in terms of their content, but also with regard to the required semester abroad: while students studying Culture and Society may study anywhere, students specializing in Conceptual and Intellectual History must spend their semester abroad at an institution focusing on the history of concepts and/or ideas.

Section 1 subsection 4:

The Faculty of Humanities is responsible for administering the degree program for Sinology.

Section 4:
Program and examination structure
Modules and ECTS credits

Section 4 subsection 2:

- (1) The master's degree program for Sinology encompasses modules that have a total of 120 ECTS credits.
- (2) In addition, the following required modules must be taken:
 - Culture and Society [SIN-M1] (18 ECTS credits)
 - History of Concepts and Ideas [SIN-M2] (18 ECTS credits)
- (3) If the Culture and Society profile is chosen, the following module must also be taken:
 - Research Approaches in International East Asian Studies [SIN-M3-FIO] (12 ECTS credits)
- (4) If the Conceptual and Intellectual History profile is chosen, the following module must also be taken:
 - Conceptual and Intellectual History: Theory and Practice [SIN-M3-CIH] (12 ECTS credits)
- (5) Semester abroad / semester at a partner university (30 ECTS credits)
Students are responsible for organizing and financing their semester abroad.
- (6) Subject-specific elective area
In the subject-specific elective area, students consolidate, expand, and supplement their subject-specific knowledge in an interest-driven and needs-oriented manner. A total of 12 ECTS credits must be completed for semester abroad.

Possible options:

- For the Conceptual and Intellectual History profile: Students expand and broaden their skills by participating in a summer school on the history of concepts and ideas, organized by the Department of Chinese Language and Culture of the Asia-Africa Institute or a partner. Participation must be agreed with a university teacher from the degree program in advance. Depending on the duration and workload, up to 6 ECTS credits can be credited. The workload is calculated in ECTS credit points pursuant to Section 4 subsection 4. A certificate of attendance from the relevant organization must be submitted, stating the number of ECTS credits earned.
 - Additional courses from the department identified in the course catalog as additional offerings in the subject-specific elective area are marked accordingly.
 - Participation in a discipline-related summer school or summer university in Germany or abroad in coordination and consultation with a teacher from the degree program (learning agreement). The workload is calculated in ECTS credit points pursuant to Section 4 subsection 4. A certificate of attendance from the relevant organization must be submitted, stating the number of ECTS credits earned.
- (7) The final module [SIN-M4] comprising 30 ECTS credits must be taken, comprising the completion of a master's thesis (25 ECTS credits) and an oral examination (5 ECTS credits including preparation time).

**Section 5:
Course types**

Section 5 subsection 3:

Attendance is compulsory for the courses in the required modules. As intensive text reading in demanding source language takes place on a weekly basis, continuous participation in the courses is essential.

**Section 14:
Master's thesis**

Section 14 subsection 1:

While the thesis in Profile A can in principle cover the entire spectrum of Sinology, the thesis in Profile B should be methodologically based on the history of concepts and ideas.

Section 14 subsection 2:

An application for permission to begin work on the final module may only be made once the required elective modules have been successfully completed:

- Required module Culture and Society
- Required module History of concepts and ideas
- Module Research Approaches in International East Asian Studies, where the profile Culture and Society has been selected
- Module Conceptual and Intellectual History: Theory and Practice, where the profile Conceptual and Intellectual History has been selected
- Semester abroad / semester at a partner university
- Subject-specific elective area

Section 14 subsection 7:

The master's thesis must be completed within five months.

**Section 15:
Evaluation of examinations**

Section 15 subsection 3 sentence 1:

- (1) If overall examination performance of a module consists of several component examinations, then the overall grade for the module is calculated from the arithmetic mean of the grades from the individual component examinations.
- (2) The calculation of the overall final grade for the master's degree includes all completed module examinations, excluding those from the subject-specific elective area, the semester abroad / semester at a partner university and the area of specialization. All module exam grades except the final module are weighted equally. The modules and courses of the subject-specific elective area, the semester abroad / semester at a partner university, as well as the modules of the area of specialization are assessed as "passed/failed". The master's thesis and the oral examination grades are used to calculate the grade for the final module using a ratio of 5:1. The grades for the module examinations are weighted 50 percent, and the grade for the final module is weighted 50 percent for the calculation of the overall final grade for the master's degree.
